During the Saxon erathis was a place of some importance; and at the period of the Norman survey, and for several subsequent reigns, was held in royal demesne, and gave name to an extensive forest. In the reign of Henry VIII it had fallen into decay, but, during the last century, experienced a revival from its cloth manufacture. Its name is derived from melch or milch, 'milk,' and ham, 'a dwelling,' and was formerly spelt Millinsham and Milsham. The lower part of the town is denominated 'the city,' a presumptive proof of its ancient superiority; and this is farther confirmed by the taillage it paid in the reign of King John, which amounted to twelve marks—Salisbury paying only forty shillings. The only modern buildings are the cheese market and the town hall, erected in 1847 by a company of shareholders, at a cost of £3,350. They form a spacious and well-arranged edifice, in the Italian style of architecture, decidedly ornamental to the town. The town hall contains a spacious apartment, in which the magistrates assemble in petty session for the division, on the last Wednesday in every month. There is also a reading room in the same building, which is well supplied with the leading journals, both metropolitan and provincial. Walter Long, Esq. is lord of the manor, and holds a court leet halfyearly. Melksham is a polling station at the election of members to represent North Wilts; and it is included'in a circuit of towns under the new County Court Act, for the recovery of debts to any amount not exceeding £50. The manufactures comprise some fine broad cloths, flat and round ropes, and sackings. The Wilts and Berks canal passes to the east of the town, pelry is about 500.

The parish church of Saint Michael is a large and dents, Wesleyan Methodists, and the Society of Friends The Melksham Union comprises six parishes: the poor-house is a substantial stone building, pleasantly situated near the pretty village of Semington. The scenery, within the circuit of a few miles round Melksham, is very charming, and the walks on the banks of the Avon remarkably agreeable. Two mineral springs one saline, the other chalybeate, were discovered in the vicinity some years ago, and in 1816 a new saline spa was obtained by boring. From this period it was anticipated that Melksham would advance into note as a watering place, and every accommodation for visiters was provided, including a pump-room, a handsome crescent, an agreeable promenade, a readingroom, and a library; but, with all these inducements, success was not commanded, and a very considerable outlay has been made without a return. The weekly market is held on Tuesday, for butter, poultay, and the usual articles of domestic consumption. On the first Tuesday in every month there is a cheese market; on the first and third Wednesdays monthly are markets for horses and cattle; and an annual fair for animals of the latter kind is held on the 27th of July. The parish of Melksham (including the chapelry of SEEND) contained in 1831, 5,866 inhabitants, and in 1841, 6,236.

SEMINGTON is a chapelry and village, in the parish of Steeple-Ashton, situated on the road between Melksham and Trowbridge, about three miles from either place.
